This spring, a group of Huntsman students, including myself, embarked on a transformative career trek to Washington, D.C., an experience that not only broadened our horizons but also deepened our understanding of the intricate tapestry of public service and international affairs.

My name is Shriya Shah, a senior in the Huntsman Program with

a German target language, concentrating in Finance at Wharton and pursuing a certificate in Human Rights through SAS & Penn Carey Law. As a Canadian student from Toronto, I've found my home away from home at Penn, where the intersection of business, language, and global affairs has shaped my academic journey and future aspirations.

Last summer, I interned at Bates White, an economic consulting firm in Washington, D.C., where I gained invaluable experience applying econometric and financial analysis to litigation matters for Fortune 500 companies, government agencies, and law firms. This internship has perfectly complemented our recent career trek, offering a real-world perspective on the application of our unique Huntsman education.

The trek itself was a whirlwind of inspiration and insight. From the hallowed halls of the Pentagon to the corridors of power in the White House, and the global reach of the World Bank, we were immersed in the beating heart of American policy and international cooperation. Each visit peeled back another layer of the complex world of public service, revealing the myriad ways our Huntsman education can be applied to effect real change on a global scale.

A highlight of our journey came at the end of the long, exhilarating day. ### United Arab Emirates: Dubai & Abu Dhabi

The Huntsman Global Immersion Program is just one of the many incredible opportunities that Huntsman students are able to experience during their time at Penn. I, like many of my classmates, jumped at the chance to pair our traditional classroom learning with on-the-ground activities.

My name is Jeslyn and I am a Junior in the Program from Toronto, Canada. I'm a Chinese (Mandarin) target, concentrating in Finance (and possibly Management) at Wharton and also pursuing a minor in Creative Writing.



During the semester, we were introduced to various streams of academic research on the growth and development of the UAE through readings, personal reflections, and discussions with Professor Balkan along with guest lecturers such as Matthew Asada (C'02 W'02) and Daniel Zilberman (WG'01 and Huntsman Advisory Board Member). After the end of the semester, we traveled to the UAE and, thus, began the packed itinerary of activities from the moment we arrived to the day we returned to Philly.

From insightful panel discussions at the Dubai International Financial Centre and Abu Dhabi Global Market to company tours of Talabat, AstroLabs (founded by Muhammed Mekki C'05 W'05), and The Bureau to visits of leading cultural institutions like the Louvre Abu Dhabi, there are simply so many highlights from this immersion experience. Our panels, for example, were made up of Huntsman and Penn alumni, Emirati professionals, as well as expats working in an array of industries ranging from healthcare to education to entrepreneurship. In these discussions, we were able to hear about their professional and personal experiences in the UAE and, in doing so, deepen our understanding of Emirati culture, business, and society.

One of my favorite itinerary items was our visit to the largest port in the Middle East—Jebel Ali Port—hosted by DP World. Not only did this tour strengthen my understanding of Dubai's advantageous geographical location, it also emphasized the UAE's ongoing pursuit for excellence and innovation through patented technologies like BOXBAY. Another highlight was our food tour of Deira with Wharton alumna Arva Ahmed and Frying Pan Adventures. This tour allowed us to see how various cultures arrived on this land of opportunity and interacted with one another since, while tasting traditional delicacies such as Za'atar and Fāloodeh.



During our travels, I found myself weaving my knowledge with new understandings from our exposure to this new cultural environment. Prompted by our visit to The Bureau, I hope to explore the more mature co-working environments in the US and Canada and compare these to the largely successful space that Nikita Patel (W'14) and Rhea Patel “designed with women’s needs in mind”.

In conclusion, this immersive, on-the-ground experience has truly shaped and reshaped my knowledge of the UAE from course materials and given rise to a deeper understanding of my own values. Whether that be the professional and industry-focused programming we engaged with or the cultural excursions we embarked on, this course allowed us to explore so much of the UAE in just a week!

This experience profoundly enriched my understanding of globalization through the lens of the UAE's growth and ambition. Discussions with Wharton alumni and local business leaders like Arva Ahmed highlight the support for entrepreneurs, further underscoring the UAE's commitment to a diversified economy. Overall, this program prompted my active reflection on sustainable and equitable development practices globally.

# STUDENT REFLECTIONS: GAP SEMESTERS



## My Year Away From Penn: Abroad in South Korea and Gap Semester in Washington D.C.

My name is Cory Shin, a Korean target in the Huntsman Class of 2025, studying Business Economics & Public Policy and Environment, Social, and Governance, with a minor in East Asian Languages and Civilizations. Originally from Chicago, Illinois, I now hail from Atlanta, Georgia, though I call Philadelphia home now.

As someone passionate about CSR, I plan on working at the intersection of business strategy and policy, working to integrate stakeholder theory into the core ethos of decision-making, as well as finding ways to quantify the value of social responsibility to shareholders. Long term, I would love nothing more than to serve my community as a public servant, so be on the lookout for my name at a ballot box near you!

I planned 2023 as my year away from Penn because I struggled with the transition into college and felt burned out from high school, doing professional marching band, etc. Studying abroad in Korea was amazing, as it was a chance to rediscover my heritage and reconnect with the Motherland.

In the fall, I received a special opportunity through the Asian Pacific American Institute for Congressional Studies to work in Washington, D.C. as a Legislative Intern for Congressman Dan Kildee (MI-08). APAICS is dedicated to not only advancing Asian-Pacific American policy issues but also helping to develop greater representation at all levels of public service. This was a tremendous opportunity that enabled me to see Capitol Hill from behind the scenes and really get to understand how our government works.

In October, I even got a chance to cross the pond and visit my mentor, Josh Yang (C'23 W'23), as well as my classmate Suhitha Kotala (C'25 W'25), plus several of my other Penn friends studying abroad and British friends from backpacking through Southeast Asia.

Overall, 2023 marked a year of self-growth





and new experiences, learning a lot about who I am and where I can continue to grow. One thing that I realized was that we all have our own journeys and quests to complete, each with different timelines and side quests. In terms of coming back to campus, I quickly reconnected with Penn.



Academically, I felt invigorated and ready to take on my classes. Having worked in Congress, I felt that this perspective enabled me to view class discussions on Energy Policy and Business Strategy from a different angle and think more specifically about the intersection of business and policy.

Professionally, it was beneficial to spend some time in Washington, learning on the ground and seeing the relationship between the private and public sectors. A large part of what we do in the business world relies on frameworks crafted by the government, so having an understanding of the process and how it affects businesses will be important in my future.

## Gap Semester in Tanzania: Volunteering at Sanaa and Born to Learn

My name is Grace Barmmer and I am a rising senior in the Huntsman Class of 2025, targeting Spanish and concentrating in Finance in Wharton. I am also minoring in Hispanic Studies and will be studying abroad in Barcelona during Fall 2024. Outside of class, I am a part of Wharton Ambassadors, Penn International Impact Consulting, and the Wharton Alumni Relations Council.

During my gap semester, I volunteered at 2 different organizations in the north of Tanzania. During half of each week,



I spent my time at Sanaa, a socially-conscious artisan shop located in the Gran Melia hotel in Arusha. All of Sanaa's products are made from 100% recycled materials and are produced on-site by members of the community with disabilities. Sanaa's profits are donated to the other organization at which I volunteered, Born to Learn (BTL). Located at the base of Mount Kilimanjaro in Moshi, BTL works to bridge the educational gap in Tanzania, providing free preschool for over 200 children through reinforcement classes and extracurricular activities. At both organizations, I helped with fundraising, marketing, organizing and tracking finances, and launching new projects and initiatives. I also taught guitar and piano!

I decided to pursue my gap semester thanks to an experience during my Sophomore year, when I served as a Senior Consultant for Penn International Impact Consulting, co-leading a team as we worked remotely with BTL and Sanaa. In May, we traveled to Moshi and Arusha to complete our work on-site and not only did I fall in love with both projects and the region, but also I realized it was the perfect opportunity to apply all parts of the Huntsman curriculum at once.

Many aspects of my gap semester connected to my experience as a Huntsman student. In October, I attended the 24th Annual East African International Trade Expo in Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania's business hub and the home of many of the world's ambassadors to the nation. Over the course of our four days, we discussed gaps and opportunities in the education system, the nationwide hardship faced during the pandemic, political violence, gift-giving culture, and even had tough conversations about negative perceptions they had of the United States. Those conversations alone granted me such a unique opportunity to develop a perspective on a nation so far away from my own that complemented the classes I had taken at Penn.

This week showed so clearly how international studies are intrinsically intertwined with global business. For countries to form successful economic relationships, they have to learn about each other on a cultural and social level, using languages and open conversations as an essential starting point.



At BTL, I also volunteered alongside three students from Barcelona, two from Madrid, and two from the Basque Country and our conversations outside of working hours would consist of a mix of Catalan, Euskara, and Castilian Spanish with little to no English. My three months in Tanzania would unexpectedly be the greatest possible opportunity to practice

the language not just “outside the classroom,” but in an environment more immersive than I could ever imagine.

The seven of us spent three months learning and practicing Swahili together so we could ask questions and learn more about the communities in which we were living. Perhaps my greatest takeaway from my time in Tanzania was that language is the most powerful and important tool in creating global cooperation and understanding. My time in Tanzania has made clear to me that I not only want to explore new languages and continue working towards fluency in Spanish, but also that I want to prioritize international opportunities that require cross-language conversations and visits to different regions around the world.

Today (July 2024), nearly ten months since that first night in Moshi, I am just over a month away from beginning my required semester abroad in Barcelona. I'll be living just minutes away from those three girls with whom I shared every day in Tanzania. I could not be more grateful to the Huntsman Program for preparing me now twice to pick up and spend a semester on the other side of the world, ready and eager to apply the skills and perspectives I've gained in my time as a Huntsman Student to create invaluable learning opportunities abroad.





# ALUMNI SPOTLIGHTS



## **Muhammed Mekki**

Arabic Target, C'05 W'05

Huntsman alum Muhammed Mekki studied Arabic as his target language, concentrated in Management in Wharton, and also pursued an additional major in Political Science in the College (through which he met Professor Sil in his senior year). Muhammed's career is full of twists and turns, with one experience building onto another and one decision leading to the next. Currently, Muhammed divides his time between the UAE and the US, living and working in Dubai while spending his summers in the Windy City.

As a part of his Huntsman studies, Muhammed completed his semester abroad at the University of Jordan—his first time living in an Arab country as an Iraqi-American. In the year after graduating, Muhammed continued his immersion and was selected as a Fulbright Fellow to live in Syria and the UAE and research Islamic finance theory and applications in ten countries across the Middle East. Together, these experiences strengthened his language skills and exposed him to the region's culture and climate.

During his time at Penn, one of the most impactful classes Muhammed took was called "Consulting to Growth Companies"—a practical course where he paid visits to and supported the growth of a Philadelphia-based small business throughout the semester. This translated into his full-time role at Diamond Management & Technology Consultants in Chicago after his Fulbright experience. In this position, Muhammed met many successful professionals and consultants who returned from MBA programs, and, although never expecting to pursue graduate studies, decided to apply to the Graduate School of Business at Stanford to recenter his focus.

Fueled by the innovative startup culture in San Francisco, Muhammed focused his classes at Stanford around entrepreneurship and venture capital. Upon graduating with his MBA, Muhammed continued his stint in consulting at McKinsey and Company in Dubai. After getting settled in the region, in 2011, Muhammed decided to dive into the world of entrepreneurship and founded Namshi, a fashion retail e-commerce company. Just over one year after Namshi's founding, Muhammed and his founding partners had hired over 100 employees and raised more than USD \$20mm in the largest tech venture capital transaction in MENA at the time. With this experience, Muhammed learned a lot by doing and wanted to play a more significant role in growing the entrepreneurial ecosystem in the Gulf.

Thus, in 2013, Muhammed co-founded AstroLabs with one of his partners at Namshi. AstroLabs spent years building the region's entrepreneurial ecosystem from within and

now mainly focuses on attracting the world's most innovative, high-growth companies to the Gulf. To date, AstroLabs has supported over 1,700 companies to set up in Saudi Arabia and the UAE, and supports these clients with ongoing regulatory compliance and operational expertise to help them scale their impact.

In 2019, Muhammed decided to go back to school, once again, and pursue a PhD in innovation and entrepreneurship at SOAS University of London. During this time, Muhammed furthered his studies regarding the development of innovation systems specifically in the Gulf, which honed his craft and complements the work he leads at AstroLabs. With his PhD, Muhammed started an adjunct role to teach at London Business School as the first Dubai-based faculty member. In his words, this position “pushed [him] to the edge of his comfort zone” in many ways, whether that be developing relevant case studies or just having the courage to get in front of 50 executive MBAs. Today, Muhammed continues his work at AstroLabs, making his mark in the thriving entrepreneurial landscape in the region, while lecturing courses in Strategy & Entrepreneurship at both the LBS London and Dubai campuses.



Looking back, Muhammed accredits the foundation that the Huntsman Program has provided him so that, when the time was right, he was able to act on the opportunity to work in the Middle East.

In the past year, Muhammed has ventured into the study of Arabic calligraphy, diversifying his studies into a more creative outlet. He has always had an appreciation for the beauty of this art form, but only recently found the time to formally take on this hobby and learn from a master in this practice based in Istanbul, Turkey—the epicenter of Arabic calligraphy. Muhammed described this transformative experience, saying “while I originally entered for the beauty and the art [of Arabic calligraphy], there is a much deeper impact I’ve realized. [...] I have much more appreciation for patience and mastery now, for example.”

Overall, Muhammed is thankful for his time in Huntsman—not just for the camaraderie, but also for the physical spaces that anchor this community, such as KC3 and the Huntsman Office. He continues to stay involved, hosting the Global Immersion class at AstroLabs in Dubai and introducing current students to the entrepreneurial and business opportunities in the Middle East.





## **Przem Macholak**

German Target, C'19 W'19

Przem Macholak is from Poland and was a part of the Huntsman Class of 2019, where he was a German target and concentrated in Business Economics and Public Policy (BEPP).

During his time in the program, Przem made the most of the resources offered by Huntsman and the university, pursuing two language studies in Germany during the summer after his freshman year (along with his semester abroad at the

Goethe University Frankfurt) and being a Perry World House Student Fellow. Paired with his Huntsman academics, these interdisciplinary experiences allowed Przem to meet people from all walks of life and exposed him to many different perspectives. When speaking on this, Przem emphasised the importance of showing up and connecting with others, since many of his most valuable lessons were learnt from attending office hours and (free) take-your-professor-to-lunch meals. As a testament to this, he offered the example of his connection with Professor Richard Ingersoll, who welcomed Przem to his graduate and PhD level classes in education and sociology at Penn GSE. Granted, this was after Przem persistently reached out to Prof. Ingersoll over the course of two semesters and, finally, decided to approach him in one of his classes.

Przem's professional career reflects his formative undergraduate experience. Starting with his junior summer, Przem interned at AMR International (acquired by Stax in November 2022) in New York City, but also briefly worked for the government in Poland. Upon graduation, Przem joined Bain & Company in its Washington D.C. office, where he gained valuable experience in a wide range of industries and continued to meet people who shared his interest in public policy. During the pandemic, Przem was able to travel back and forth between Poland and the US, which, in hindsight, accelerated his later decision to move back to Poland permanently.



In his third year at Bain, Przem took the opportunity to pursue his externship in Poland, where he had originally hoped to pursue work in education. However, with the escalation to the Russo-Ukrainian War in 2022, Przem found a more urgent cause in providing care to the children caught in the crossfires of this conflict. After hearing about others who have welcomed and housed Ukrainian refugees in Poland, Przem was determined to support Poland's humanitarian response to the conflict and joined a friend at the Polish-Ukrainian border.

Thus, Przem joined Fundacja Happy Kids, an NGO that is revolutionising—or rather deinstitutionalizing—the foster care in Poland and creating new standards of care for orphaned children. At the border, Przem led the Ukraine Crisis Response for the NGO, coordinating and providing shelter for more than 1,500 Ukrainian children and their guardians, whilst providing medical care and educational facilities. This operation was soon noticed by large corporations and the government, which allowed Przem to mobilise 60 people in joining this cause. When asked about his experience at the border, Przem described this experience as being very tough physically, but also emphasising that “rarely in your life, do you feel such a clear sense of mission and purpose. [...] Despite the horrors of the war, [...] you see this beauty of friendship and solidarity and helping others.”

After this experience, Przem knew he wanted to stay in Poland and decided to pursue his masters at the College of Europe in Natolin, a formative year-long program packed with meeting policy makers and watching *The West Wing*. Thereafter, Przem convinced a friend from the NGO to run for the upcoming Polish elections. This was no easy journey, from gathering a group of 15 people to sleeping on mattresses in an apartment to help Przem’s friend run her campaign,



but the hard work paid off and she became the youngest person in parliament and the only person of color. This experience further established Przem’s hope to help young people to break into politics. This goal to have a systemic impact led Przem to his current role, where he is the Deputy Director at the Ministry of State Assets, where he is able to marry his consulting skill set and humanitarian experience in making an impact on the Polish economy.



Przem reasons that his decision to return to Poland is driven by his gratitude and appreciation for the country, as well as his search for impact. Looking back at these experiences, his advice is to not be afraid to do things that aren’t easy: “a lot of the problems in our world require interdisciplinary responses, [...] leverage our global perspectives, our empathy, go and do.” It might feel intimidating at first, but just take the first step and, of course, don’t forget to build those connections along the way. He also highlights Huntsman as being a challenging, yet defining experience. Today, he continues to stay engaged with the Program community, whether the trip to Kenya this winter or the many housewarming parties for those who move across the pond.

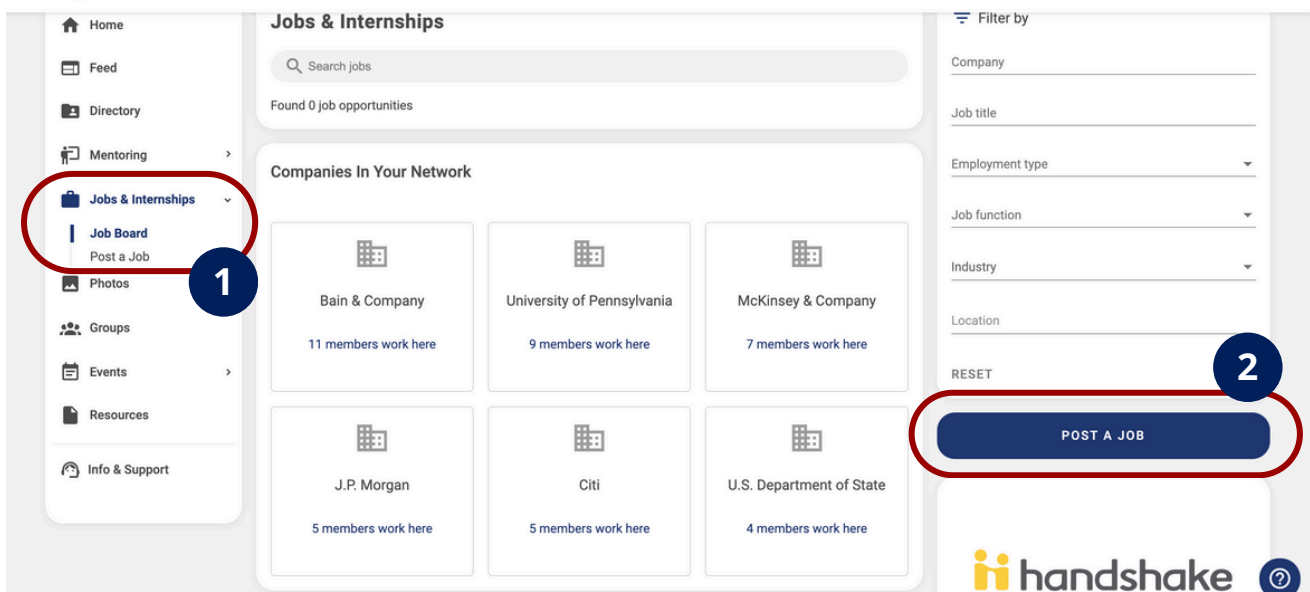

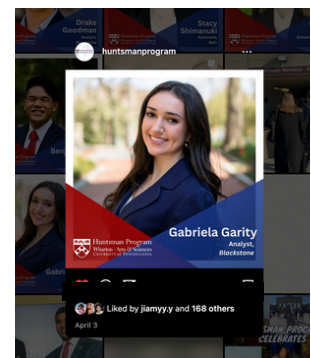
